

MISSION

GOALS

The goal of the Arkansas Crime Victims Reparations program is to provide compensation for victims' unexpected expenses, such as medical treatment, mentalhealth counseling, rehabilitation, lost wages, replacement services, and funeral expenses.

CHAIRMAN'S COMMENTS

As a spokesperson for the Arkansas Crime Victims Reparation Board (ACVRB), I thank you for the opportunity to submit comments on the 2023 Annual Report. The report covers the activities of the ACVRB from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023. The Board and the team always seek to provide timely financial assistance to the citizens or the State of Arkansas, who have suffered personal injury or loss as a result of a violent crime.

This report outlines the ACVRB mission and goals, and identifies Board members and staff, provides a summary of claims received and awarded; and covers total compensation disbursed to Crime Victims and Sexual Assault Victims. Also, the report provides a county-by-county breakdown of the number of awarded claims and compensation received by citizens of each Arkansas county, and some examples of the types of financial assistance paid out by ACVRB and highlights special activities throughout the year.

The ACVRB is listed under the Arkansas Department of Public Safety (DPS), and we are appreciative for their continued leadership and support. We want to thank Colonel Mike Hagar, Director of DPS, Hugh Finkelstein, Chief of Staff, Jesi Feld, Assigned Attorney to ACVRB, Karen Perry, DPS Financial Officer, and Phillip Warriner, DPS Human Resource Administrator.

Starting in 1/1/2023, Mr. Steve Eggensperger was appointed as the Interim ACVRB Administrator. He worked to get approval for some part-time workers to assist ACVRB staff with working on a backlog of Sexual Assault claims.

On 7/3/2023, Ms. Lisette Yang was appointed ACVRB Administrator. During her tenure she has successfully requested and obtained promotions for two team members, trained staff on Child Abuse Mandate Reported, provided the team with Mental Health Vicarious Trauma training, began implementing cross training with all of the ACVRB team, held a meet and greet with the new ACVRB Members; and secured one extra person to help with SA claims backlog and to begin working with CV claims as well. Ms. Yang has also requested and received approval to hire an Administrative Specialist III that will provide needed help to the entire ACVRB team. Also, the ACVRB team provided program training in several counties across the state and completed 67 site visits, trained about 315 staff members, and distributed over 8,530 promotional materials. She and her team has successfully promoted the 2024 ACVRB Advocate of the Year nominations, and increased participation from 5 nominations to 23. At this time, they are working on funding so the Team can attend a National Conference and to redesign and purchase marketing materials to promote the program across the state. In addition, they are working on materials and victim applications so they can be available in Spanish in the near futue. The ACVRB fiscal sources are from the following: VOCA Grant, General Revenue (State Funding), Court Fees, Administration Justice Funds and Damage Settlement Fees (Restitution).

Finally, the ACVRB is very honored to have a great competent and dedicated Team. They are Tonya Hooks, Melinda Perkins, Varnell Messer, Gary McGee, Michaela Thomas, and Karen Heer whom work very diligently to serve the citizens of Arkansas. Also, I would like to thank my fellow Board members Paula Steinsiek, Molly Shepard, Bilenda Harris-Ritter, Rebecca Petty, and Jordan Snowden for their tireless service and commitment to the Board and the citizens of the State of Arkansas.

- An 18-year-old Chicot County man was shot in the face by one of his friends. This young man lived and the Crime Victims' Program was able to assist by maxing out the claim at \$25,000 towards medical expenses and lost wages.
- A 49-year-old Pulaski County woman was shot and killed by her boyfriend. The Crime Victim's Program was able to assist with funeral expenses.
- A 45-year-old Logan County woman was shot and killed by her son. The Crime Victims' Program was able to assist with funeral expenses.
- A 38-year-old Crittenden County woman was shot and killed by her boyfriend. The Crime Victims' Program was not only able to help with the funeral expenses but was also able to help with lost wages for 5 secondary victims related to her.
- An 8-month pregnant 19-year-old Cross County woman was shot by multiple suspects. The Crime Victims' Program was able to assist with lost wages.
- A 56-year-old Pike County woman located the deceased bodies of her son, daughterin-law, and 23-month-old granddaughter. The Crime Victims' Program was able to assist with mileage and mental health expenses.
- A 37-year-old Bradley County man was shot in his left check while in a verbal altercation/argument. The Crime Victims' Program was able to max out his claim and assist with \$10,000 of lost wages.
- A tender-aged Garland County child was abused by his father and died as a result. The 33-year-old mother of the victim sought out counseling services and the Crime Victims' Program was able to assist with mental health expenses, funeral expenses, and medical expenses.
- A 16-year-old Craighead County girl was sexually assaulted by a coach at her high school. The Crime Victims' Program was able to assist with mental health counseling.
- A 41-year-old Perry County man was attempting to stop an intoxicated driver with a child passenger when he was struck by the vehicle. The Crime Victims' Program was able to max out his claim and assist with \$10,000 of lost wages.


