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Forward

The Arkansas Crime Information Center (ACIC), a Division of the Arkansas Department of Public Safety, is pleased to provide its 2022 Annual Report.

Act 286 of 1971 created the Arkansas Crime Information Center. Its original name was the Criminal Justice and Highway Safety Information Center. It was originally part of the Department of Finance and Administration. Act 742 of 1975 transferred the agency to the Department of Public Safety. Act 375 of 1979 changed the name of the agency to the current Arkansas Crime Information Center. Act 45 of 1981 abolished the Department of Public Safety, leaving ACIC as a separate agency with all the same functions, powers, and duties.

Act 1109 of 1993 expanded the authority of ACIC to administer the Computerized Criminal History Record System. This includes arrest records for all felony and Class A misdemeanor offenses, plus the judicial disposition of each record. This is the source file for all criminal history background checks.

Act 989 of 1997 expanded the authority of ACIC to administer the Sex and Child Offender Registry. This registry of sex offenders is accessible in Arkansas and by the other 49 states for authorized purposes.

Act 1250 of 1997 expanded the authority of ACIC to administer the Crime Victim Notification System. This system, commonly referred to as the VINE system, provides offender status information from all county jails and prosecuting attorneys to the victims of crime.

Act 508 of 2007 expanded the authority of ACIC to administer the electronic notebook for sales of ephedrine and pseudoephedrine.

Act 749 of 2007 expanded the authority of ACIC to administer the scrap metal recycling log.

Amendment 51 to the Arkansas Constitution authorized ACIC to provide felony conviction information to the Secretary of State for voter registration purposes.

As part of the Transformation of State Government Act 910 of 2019 created a new Department of public Safety and ACIC became a Division within the new Department.

ACIC is led by a Director who is appointed by the ACIC Supervisory Board with a recommendation from the Governor of Arkansas. The Director reports to the Secretary of the Department of Public Safety. The ACIC Supervisory Board consists of the following individuals:

- The Attorney General or one of his or her assistants
- The Chief Justice of the Arkansas Supreme Court or his or her designated agent
- A member designated by the Arkansas Prosecuting Attorneys Association

- A member designated by the Arkansas Sheriffs' Association
- A member designated by the Arkansas Association of District Judges
- A member designated by the President of the Arkansas Bar Association who is regularly engaged in criminal defense work
- Two citizens of the State of Arkansas appointed by the Governor for four-year terms
- A member designated by the Arkansas Municipal Police Association
- The Director of the Division of Correction or his or her designee
- A member designated by the Arkansas Association of Chiefs of Police
- A member designated by the Association of Arkansas Counties
- The Director of the Arkansas State Police or his or her designee
- The Governor or a member of the Governor's staff designated by the Governor

We hope this Report will be a valuable resource for criminal justice agencies, elected officials and the citizens of Arkansas.

General Description of the Agency

Established by Act 286 of 1971, ACIC is the state agency responsible for providing information technology services to law enforcement and other criminal justice agencies in Arkansas.

The principal role of ACIC is the administration of a comprehensive data system that is accessible by criminal justice agencies in over 250 locations in Arkansas. This state system is interfaced with the FBI National Crime Information Center, as well as similar systems in the other 49 states and territories. ACIC also collects and publishes statistics on crime, manages the crime victim notification system, and the state sex offender registry.

With the exception of crime statistics and the public sex offender website, access to most data maintained in the ACIC system is restricted to governmental criminal justice officials for criminal justice purposes and is specifically exempted from the Freedom of Information Act.

The authority for ACIC is contained in Arkansas law (A.C.A. § 12-12-201 – 214; § 12-12-1001 – 1015; § 12-12-908 et seq.; and § 12-12-1201).


Mission Statement

Organization

Organizationally, ACIC is divided into three sections. The primary responsibilities of each sections are:

- Directorial Section includes the Director, Assistant to the Director, and Receptionist. This Section's responsibilities include, but are not limited to, ACIC Board meetings, website maintenance, social media presence, managing grants, inventory, fleet, mail, supplies and other daily office duties.
- Operations Section manages the entry of records for Arkansas into the National Crime Information Center, processes requests for connection to the state criminal justice system, provides assistance in coding records for entry and the general liaison with system users, including offline searches and investigative research, record validation, audit coordination, and information security. The other systems the section is responsible for are the ACIC Launch Pad, CJIS Online, Online Stolen Vehicle Verification Form, Crime Victims Notification Program, JusticeXchange, Alert Express, the Electronic Logbook for ephedrine and pseudoephedrine sales and the Metal Theft sales log. The section is also responsible for Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR), National Incident Based Reporting (NIBRS), the National Data Exchange (N-DEx), all of the ACIC Field Agents, and conducts all ACIC training for the associated programs.
- Special Services Section is responsible for administering the state's central repository of criminal history records, including entry and verification of all records, and for responding to citizens requests for review of their files. Additionally, it manages the Arkansas Sex Offender Registry and conducts training for criminal justice and court agencies on criminal history and sex offender matters. This section together with the Operations section is responsible for all misuse investigations.



Wanted Person File



The Query Wanted transaction is use to search the people files at NCIC, Arkansas Driver's License file and other states Driver's License File.




Searches on People Through the ACIC System in 2022

Missing Persons

Missing persons are classified into one of the following categories for entry:

- Juvenile Entry of a person under the age of 21 who is missing and does not meet any of the entry criteria set forth in the other categories.
- Endangered Entry of a person of any age who is missing under circumstances indicating that his/her physical safety may be in danger.
- Involuntary Entry of a person of any age who is missing under circumstances indicating that the disappearance may not have been voluntary, i.e., abduction or kidnapping.
- Disability A person of any age who is missing and under proven physical/mental disability or is senile, thereby subjecting him/herself or others to personal and immediate danger.
- **Catastrophe Victim** A person of any age who is missing after a catastrophe.
- Other A person over the age of 21 not meeting the criteria for entry in any category who is missing and for whom there is a reasonable concern for his/her safety.



Arkansas had 538 Missing Persons in the national file at the end of 2022.

Unidentified Person File


The Unidentified Person File contains records of:


Deceased persons whose identity cannot be determined. This also includes recovered body parts when a body has been dismembered.

Living persons who are unable to provide information about their identity i.e., amnesia victim, infant, physical or mental impairments.

Catastrophe victims whose identity cannot be determined or body parts when body has been dismembered as the result of a catastrophe.

Arkansas had 105 Unidentified Persons in the national file at the end of 2022.






Violent Persons File

The Violent Person File (VPF) was designed to alert law enforcement officers that an individual they are encountering may have the propensity for violence against law enforcement.


Arkansas had 263 Violent Persons in the national file at the end of 2022.



Medical Marijuana

Amendment 98 of 2016 allows for the use of medical marijuana when in Arkansas. In 2018, ACIC implemented Medical Marijuana transactions allowing the law enforcement community access to the information if needed. There are two transactions law enforcement can use. The first is the QMM or Query Medical Marijuana Card. When law enforcement is presented with a Medical Marijuana card.


The second transaction is the QMAN or Query Manifest. This allows law enforcement to query the manifest of a shipment of medical marijuana.




Vehicle File

By NCIC's definition, a Vehicle is motor driven objects designed to carry its operator with the exception of a boat. Also in this file are aircraft and trailers.








Boat File


A boat is defined by NCIC as a vessel for transport by water.




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
Part File

Parts are any serially-numbered component from a vehicle or boat, and ownership documentation for a vehicle or boat.




Gun File

The Article file contains records of stolen property that do not have their own file such at telephones, computers, TVs, gaming systems, animals, etc.






The Securities File contains records of securities stolen, embezzled, used for ransom, or counterfeited

ACIC Systems Audit

The Arkansas Crime Information Center (ACIC) is mandated by the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) to conduct several audits of law enforcement and criminal justice agencies that utilize the various Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS) system. These audits include the ACIC Systems Audit, ACIC System Security Check Audit, CJIS IT Security Audit, Noncriminal Justice Agency Audit, and the Criminal History Arrest and Disposition Audit. Also, with the addition of agencies accessing National Data Exchange (N-DEx) through the Regional Organized Crime Information Center (ROCIC), ACIC will have to implement an N-DEx audit.



VINE


VINE is an acronym for "Victim Information and Notification Everyday," however; you do not have to be a victim of a crime to use this system. VINE allows anyone to check the location and status of offenders, and to register for notification of events related to a particular offender. The program is often referred to as Arkansas VINE.


Arkansas was the first state in the nation to implement an automated information and notification system that includes data from all county jails, some prosecuting attorneys, the Arkansas Department of Community Correction, and the Arkansas Department of Correction.






Total New Registration by Type in 2022








New 2022 Registrations by Type of Notification




This is a database of booking records and mugshots of offender who have been incarcerated in Arkansas. In 2022, Arkansas had over **4,097,492** booking records with over **2,353,574** mugshots in the system. With the agencies around the nation submitting their records to this system, Arkansas criminal justice officials have access to over 140 million booking records and over 40 million mugshots.



Users are able to enter Watches on individuals, to be informed when a person is release from custody or has been processed into a detention facility.







Watch hits are notifications to users when a person has been released from custody or processed into a detention facility.

These numbers are only for JusticeXchange. DL Photos can also be retrieved through the Messenger interface.


AlertXpress


It is a mass notification system that ACIC provides to the criminal justice community free of charge. AlertXpress provides Criminal Justice Agencies with the ability to rapidly create and deliver emergency or large-scale notifications to groups of people, such as prison escape, severe weather, jury duty reminders, sex offender notifications, etc. The website AlertXpress is only accessible through JusticeXchange.



Metal Theft Investigative System (Scrap Metal)

Act 390 of 2009 mandated ACIC to develop, deploy and maintain an electronic system for monitoring the sale of scrap metal in Arkansas. This system requires that Arkansas scrap metal dealers to electronically record and maintain information at the time of sale, the seller's driver's license, military identification card, passport, or other form of governmental-issued photo identification, a digital thumbprint of the seller, along with a description and quantity of materials sold, and the amount paid and a statement attesting that the seller is the rightful owner of the material being sold.







NPLEx or the National Precursor Log Exchange

In 2007, the Arkansas State Legislature passed Act 508 which created a centralized real-time electronic logbook to document the purchase of ephedrine products at pharmacies. Through NPLEx, Arkansas criminal justice officials access data from 448 pharmacies from around the state. They also have access to data from 33 other states. Criminal justice officials can perform searches based on name or driver's license number. They can also see the purchases at specific pharmacies in real-time. The users of the system can also enter watches on individuals.

The Statistical Analysis Center (SAC) within ACIC responsible for The Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR), the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS), and the Law Enforcement National Data Exchange (N-DEx). The SAC performs research and crime analysis activities to encourage the application of new technology in record and communications systems. Throughout the year the Statistical Analysis Center (SAC) at ACIC publishes a number of statistical reports, including the annual Arkansas Crime Statistics.

(Note: The program continues to receive data from agencies well into the next year. The 2022 numbers are not to be used for research, for grant funding, data requests, etc. The final 2022 data will be published by June 30, 2023.)

Release of Hot File Information

In the early 2000s, the ACIC Supervisory Board determined that it would be in the best interest of the people of Arkansas if an agency could tell a concerned citizen if a piece of property is stolen or a person is wanted. This could potentially aid in the recovery of stolen property and the apprehension of wanted persons.

Should a positive response to an inquiry on persons or property be received, ACIC will refer the information to a law enforcement officer that can interview the requesting citizen for further information, which could lead to the apprehension of the wanted person or recovery of the stolen property.

- Criminal History Division

The Special Services Division is responsible for administering the state's central repository of criminal history records including entry and verification of all records and responds to citizens requests for review of their files. Additionally, it manages the Arkansas Sex Offender Registry and conducts training for criminal justice and court agencies on criminal history and sex offender matters. This section together with the Operations section is responsible for all misuse investigations.



Criminal History Division

The Criminal History Division (CHD) is responsible for administering the state's central repository of criminal history records including data collection, quality control, data entry, verification of all records and responds to citizen's requests for review of their files. This section together with the Operations section is responsible for all misuse investigations.

A computerized criminal history consists of Criminal Name Information, Arrest Information, Disposition Information, Incarceration Information, and Release Information.


